## SHOW REGULATIONS

1. The Kellerberrin & Districts Agricultural Society Inc (KDAS) committee shall not be held responsible for any loss or damage to exhibits.
2. KDAS maintains the right to refuse any entry without giving reason for so doing.
3. Articles which have previously won a prize are not eligible for re-exhibition.
4. The Show will be open to the public on Saturday 5th October, from 10.am.  
Admission prices Adult \$10 , School aged children (to 16yrs) \$5 , under school aged children are free. Pensioners \$5.
5. Every exhibit must be bona fide property of the exhibitor, both at the time of entry and on Show Day.
6. Every exhibit in sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 9, 10, 11,12 and 13 except where stated must have been grown or made by the exhibitor.
7. All exhibits in Junior Sections 5, 6, 7 & 8 must have been made by the exhibitor.
8. Entry fees (unless a Member) must be paid in full with the entry form as described in the Schedule. (Entries are currently free).
9. All exhibits must be placed in the location set apart for them, with Section tickets affixed thereto, between 3.00 pm and 5.00 pm on Friday 4th October, 2024 or by 8.00am on Saturday 5th October, 2024.
10. Entries are received subject to the Show regulations and by-laws, the special regulations in each Section and the uniform by-laws under the Royal Agricultural Society Act 1926. (The Society)
11. Late entries in Senior Sections will be penalised prize money for each exhibit. Points will continue to count towards overall scores.
12. Exhibits are to remain in exhibition until 4.30pm on Show day. All exhibits to be removed from the venue by 5.30pm.
13. Livestock may be removed after 4.00pm. Earlier removal will require the express authority of the KDAS Secretary or Chief Steward.
14. Judging in all classes (except photography) will commence at 8.00am on Show day.
15. Judges and officials only are permitted in exhibit areas during judging.
16. Judges may direct the relocation of any exhibit which in their opinion is entered into the wrong class and they shall direct the Stewards to place the item in the correct class.
17. Judges may award a "Highly Commended" or "Most Outstanding" prize when an exhibit is seen to warrant it. These prizes earn neither monetary value nor points.
18. Judges may withhold a prize when they consider an exhibit unworthy or reduce a prize to the merit of the exhibit. Prize cards or points may be awarded at the Judges discretion.
19. Points will be allotted in accordance with the following: 1st prize—3points , 2nd prize—2points. In the Wool Section an additional 3points will be allotted to Grand Champion, 2points to Reserve Champion and 1point to Champion..
20. Should there be a tie in any Section in which points are awarded, the exhibitor gaining the greatest number of 1st prizes shall be declared the winner.

21. Protests must be lodged no later than 3.00pm on Show day. A fee of \$2.00 , which may become forfeit if a protest is judged frivolous, must accompany each protest. The decision of the Complaints Committee is final. The Complaints Committee comprises of the KDAS President, Vice President and Chief Steward of the Section concerned.
22. Approved entertainment only will be permitted on the Show ground.
23. The KDAS committee may at any time disqualify from exhibiting either, indefinitely, or for such a period as it may deem fit, any exhibitor who has in the opinion of the committee (a) been found guilty of any breach of the regulations, or (b) whose conduct, whether at or during any Show of the Society has been such that he or she is unfit to exhibit at any Show of the Society.
24. A person who has been disqualified from exhibiting at any Show of the Royal Agricultural Society (RAS) or by any Show affiliated therewith, shall not, for the period of the disqualification be permitted to act an agent, representative or servant of any exhibitor at any Show of the society.
25. During a period of disqualification entries will not be received from any person disqualified by the RAS or by any Society associated therewith. Should any entry be accidentally accepted it shall be deemed to be void and the entry fee returned to the exhibitor.
26. Owners must provide for the feeding and watering of livestock.
27. Livestock which have been exhibited at any unregistered Show will be disqualified from competing at any Show of the society and the exhibitor of such stock will be disqualified.
28. Vermin infested stock will not be permitted in the Show grounds.

### Jan Dixons’ Melt and Mix Fruit Cake

#### *Place in a bowl,*

1 1/2 kg mixed fruit (I use 1 pkt commercial mixed fruit and add 250g cherries, 125g currants and 125g raisins or any combination you fancy)

1/2 cup sherry, brandy or whisky

2 granny smith apples, grated

1 1/2 tbsps honey or golden syrup

1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed

#### *Mix well with a wooden spoon, then add*

250g melted butter, cooled

4 eggs, lightly beaten

#### *Sift together*

1 1/2 cups plain flour 1/2 cup SR flour and 1 teasp mixed spice

#### *Add to mixture.*

Place mixture in to 23cm round, or 20cm deep square tin lined with greaseproof paper brought up 3cm above the rim of the tin. Decorate with blanched almonds.

(Cover with alfoil for the first 2 hours, then remove for last baking)

Bake in a slow oven for 3 1/2 hrs or until cooked when tested.

Remove from oven and sprinkle with alcohol of choice and cover with foil until cooler and then wrap in plastic food wrap. Will keep at least 6 months



## ROASTED RED CAPSICUM MUFFINS

### Ingredients:

1 large red capsicum  
1 tbsp olive oil  
1 small red onion, chopped  
2 1/2 cups SR flour  
1/3 cup finely shredded fresh basil  
1 cup milk  
2 eggs  
150g butter, melted and cooled  
Salt & cracked black pepper to season

### Method:

**Preheat** oven to moderate hot (200°). Lightly brush twelve 1/2cup muffin holes with oil or melted butter. Cut the capsicum into large pieces, removing seeds and membrane. Place skin side up under hot grill until the skin blackens and blisters. Cool under a tea towel, then peel away the skin and chop the flesh.

**Heat** the oil in frypan, add onion and cook until soft and slightly golden. Cool slightly.

**Sift** the flour into a bowl and season well with salt and cracked black pepper. Stir in the basil and make a well in the centre. In a jug, whisk together the milk and eggs and pour into the well. Add the melted butter.

**Fold** gently with a metal spoon until just combined. Stir in the capsicum and onion. DO NOT overmix—the batter should be lumpy. Over mixing will make the muffins tough.

**Fill** each muffin hole 3/4 full with mixture. Bake for 20—25 mins, or until the muffins are risen, golden and come away from the side of the tin. Gently loosen each muffin and lift out on to a wire rack as soon as you remove the muffins from the oven.

Serve warm.

## BANANA MUFFINS

### Ingredients

225g plain flour  
0.5 tsp baking powder  
1 tsp bicarb soda  
0.5 tsp salt  
3 ripe bananas mashed  
155g caster sugar  
1 egg, lightly beaten  
75g butter, melted and cooled

Preheat oven to 180C degrees and grease muffin tins.

Sift flour, bicarb soda, salt and baking powder together into a bowl and keep to side. Mash bananas and mix with sugar, egg and butter in a large bowl.

Once mixed, fold in flour mix and stir until smooth. Spoon mixture into muffin tins and bake for 25 to 30 minutes or until muffins have spring like nature.

Rest for 10 minutes before removing from tins.

### MIXED BERRY JAM

Prep: 10mins Cook: 30mins

#### Ingredients:

1 Lemon  
250g fresh or frozen blackberries  
250g fresh or frozen blueberries  
250g fresh or frozen raspberries  
250g fresh or frozen strawberries, halved  
1kg white sugar  
1 tsp vanilla bean paste

#### Method:

Juice the lemon, reserving the seeds (you'll need 1/3 cup / 80ml of lemon juice). Place the seeds in a small square of muslin. Bring the corners together to enclose the seeds and tie with kitchen string to secure.

Combine berries in a large heavy-based saucepan. Add the sugar, lemon juice and lemon seeds in muslin. Stir to combine. Set aside for 30mins or until the berries begin to break down and release their juices.

Place the saucepan over low heat. Cook, stirring occasionally, for 10mins or until the sugar dissolves. Increase heat to high and bring to the boil. Reduce heat to medium and simmer, stirring occasionally, for 15-20mins or until the jam reaches setting point. (To test if the jam is set, place a saucer in the freezer for 10-15mins to chill. Remove the jam from heat and place a small spoonful on the chilled saucer. Return saucer to freezer for 1 min. Run your finger through the jam to test if it wrinkles and gels. If it doesn't, return jam to heat for 5mins, then repeat test). Stir in the vanilla.

Use tongs to remove lemon seeds from jam. Discard. Use a large metal spoon to skim any scum from the surface. Carefully divide the hot jam to sterilised jars and seal. Turn upside down for 2mins. Turn upright. Set aside to cool completely.

Store in a cool dark place for up to 6months. Refrigerate once open.

Note that Stewards have exclusive charge in arranging exhibits in each Section and may move any exhibit to another Class if deemed appropriate. Please check Sections for additional information.

### ARTS & CRAFTS

- All Art is to be prepared for hanging. Exhibits on paper should be mounted and backed, ready for hanging.

### COOKERY

- **ALWAYS** check the Schedule for recipe and number of items required.
- Cakes **MUST NOT** be cooled on wire racks.
- Prepare in sufficient time to enable exhibits to cool thoroughly before being exhibited.
- All cookery must be displayed on suitable bases to match the size and shape of the entry – square cake with square plate. White paper plates may be used. Cookery is to be suitably covered in clear bags (oven bags are good), sufficiently large to hold cut pieces and allow judges easy access.
- A biscuit is forced, rolled or cut. A cookie is dropped off a spoon or rolled by hand. Biscuits should be pale brown in colour and even in size and should snap as they break. Biscuits should be made separately, not baked as a slice and then cut.
- Chocolate cake should have a strong taste and aroma. NO Mud cakes – different recipe.
- Scones should be even in size and shape (approx. 2cm thick before cooking). Should be golden brown, finished with egg or milk. Dust flour off the bottom before presenting.
- Muffins are to be made in muffin tin trays – DO NOT use paper cases.
- Sponges should be level, yellow in colour and have a smooth top (no wrinkles). Crust on base and sides (no papering of tins). No custard powder should be used in recipe.

### PRODUCE, JAMS & PRESERVES

- Jars with plain screw tops or jars with clear cellophane covers must be used.
- All exhibits must be labeled with the name of contents, list of ingredients and date of making.
- Contents should reach the bottom of the neck of each jar. Wipe and clean each jar including inside the neck and the top of each lid, with a wet cloth to clean spills.
- Open jars to check for mould.
- Jams have small pieces of fruit. Conserves have large pieces of fruit.
- Watch for pieces of kernel in Apricot jam, as the kernel is poisonous.
- A preserve made with citrus is a marmalade, not a jam.
- Eggs should be displayed on a plate (no cardboard cartons).

### FLORICULTURE

- Display Pansies and Petunias on collars and in separate water containers.
- For Floating bowls, flowers must be floating with no water showing. No stems touching the bottom of the bowl.

### NEEDLEWORK

- Needlework may be pressed but not washed. Quilts may be washed to remove marking lines.
- Ensure dimensions match – sleeves are the same length and squares are square.
- Knitting – sew buttons on with wool.
- Knitted toys must have hand worked eyes etc. no buttons or purchased eyes.
- Exhibits attached to paper or other background material must be secured with pins – sewn fixings are not acceptable.

### PHOTOGRAPHY

Please see the Section for conditions.

### VEGETABLES & FRUIT

- Big is not always best.
- Cauliflower – leave shortened leaves around the head of the exhibit.
- Citrus fruits to have 5cm of stem of leaf attached.
- Clean citrus fruits with a soft nail brush and soapy water.
- Silverbeet/Celery – sit in water to keep fresh until the last minute. Remove roots for presentation.
- Vegetables and fruit to have 2/3 foliage reduction.

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## JUDGING HINTS FOR JUNIOR CLASSES

Please read the Schedule carefully and follow all Section rules.

### ARTS & CRAFTS

Handwriting competition: Please read the Schedule carefully for correct style etc, for your age group. Entry size should be A4. Decorating is allowed but **HANDWRITING** only will be judged.

LEGO needs to be constructed bearing in mind that the article will be transported and moved within the display area by the Stewards. Height, size and weight need to be considered.

### COOKERY

Check the schedule for the correct number and size of items to exhibit.

Items for Practical School Lunch should be made by the exhibitor when possible; they should be wholesome and what would be considered to be "your every day" lunch box content.

### FLORAL ART

Check the Schedule for correct sizes and instructions.

Floating bowls – flowers **MUST** be floating with no water showing. Stems must not touch the bottom of the container.

Arrangements – type of container used is taken into consideration.

Use vases or pots – no glass jars.

Practice with flowers to make sure they don't wilt or close up when picked.

### PHOTOGRAPHY

Make sure all photographs are securely mounted on all corners using photo corners (available from the Newsagency). See Section 10 (page 38) for more details on mounting photos.

**BLACK mounting card is preferred but not essential.**

A label must be attached to each fleece showing the name of the exhibitor and class in which the fleece is entered. Judges have the authority to transfer to an appropriate Class any exhibit which has been wrongly entered. Fleeces must be skirted to the standard recognised by the selling brokers. Bellies and pieces **MUST NOT** be attached to fleeces. Fleeces must be rolled. Fleeces from pet are prohibited.

Lambs wool will be judged on general type and trueness of type. All wool will be judged on a points system in accordance with the scale:-
